TANKS RUMBLE, BIRDS GRUMBLE KIRTLAND WARBLER IN BIG DANGER

Michigan National Guard and State Conservation Department officials are studying an unusual problem this week.

Friends of the rare Kirtland's warbler have protested to the Guard and Conservation leaders that M-48 tanks last month tore up a nesting area of the birds.

The Warbler attracted attention earlier this year when his promoters lost a bid in the state Legislature to have the rare bird replace the robin as the state bird.

SAFE TRIP UP HERE

Movement of the main body of the 46th Division to Camp Grayling Saturday was accomplished without a major mishap according to Division military police.

There were no accidents, traffic or otherwise, involving equipment of the Michigan National Guard. Two minor traffic mishaps with private vehicles were reported. Both were car-deer collisions.

At 4:45 a.m. on M-72 six miles east of Kalkaska, a deer ran in front of a car driven by 26-year-old SP-4 Kerry Deacons of Co. C, 107 Signal Bn. There was no injury.
